UMass ARC PBRN Pilot Project Awards 2024 Call for Applications: Letters of intent are due September 16, 2024

The UMass Ambulatory Research Consortium (ARC) practice-based research network (PBRN) welcomes submissions for pilot project awards. Study teams should include a practicing clinician and a health services investigator. Awardees will have access to support from PBRN core staff, the DOM Research Core, and CCTS cores, as appropriate for the project. Projects that address one or more of the following areas are encouraged:

- Development or piloting of interventions focused on improving health outcomes, patient engagement, or patient/caregiver experience in primary care
- Development or piloting of interventions that address clinician satisfaction or engagement in primary care
- Research topics that are relevant to primary care
- New approaches to linking practices to community-based organizations to improve health outcomes or health equity
- Digital health solutions to improve patient experience, outcomes, equity, or practice efficiency

August 23rd is **International Day for the Remembrance of the Slave Trade and its Abolition**. This day was designated by UNESCO to memorialize the transatlantic slave trade on the anniversary of the uprising in Santo Domingo (today Haiti and the Dominican Republic) that initiated the abolition of slavery in the Caribbean. Did you ever wonder why Haiti is the poorest country in our hemisphere? Well freedom wasn't free. The **Haiti Independence Debt** was an 1825 agreement between Haiti and France that included France demanding an indemnity of 150 million francs to be paid by Haiti in claims over property – including Haitian slaves – that was lost through the Haitian Revolution. Over the 122 years

between 1825 and 1947, Haiti paid approximately \$34 billion to France rather than spending it on economic development or for infrastructure and public services.



Women's Equality Day

Women's Equality Day is observed on **August 26th** each year. It commemorates the adoption of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which granted women the right to vote. The amendment was certified on August 26, 1920.

Women's Equality Day honors the achievements of the women's suffrage movement and serves as a reminder of the ongoing efforts toward gender equality in various spheres, including the workplace, education, and politics.

Women's Equality Day serves to highlight and promote awareness of the

broader issues of gender equality and women's rights. This includes advocating for: equal pay, workplace equality, reproductive rights, political representation, education and career opportunities, combating gender-based violence, and more. Overall, this day highlights the progress made and the work still needed to ensure equal rights and opportunities for all women!
